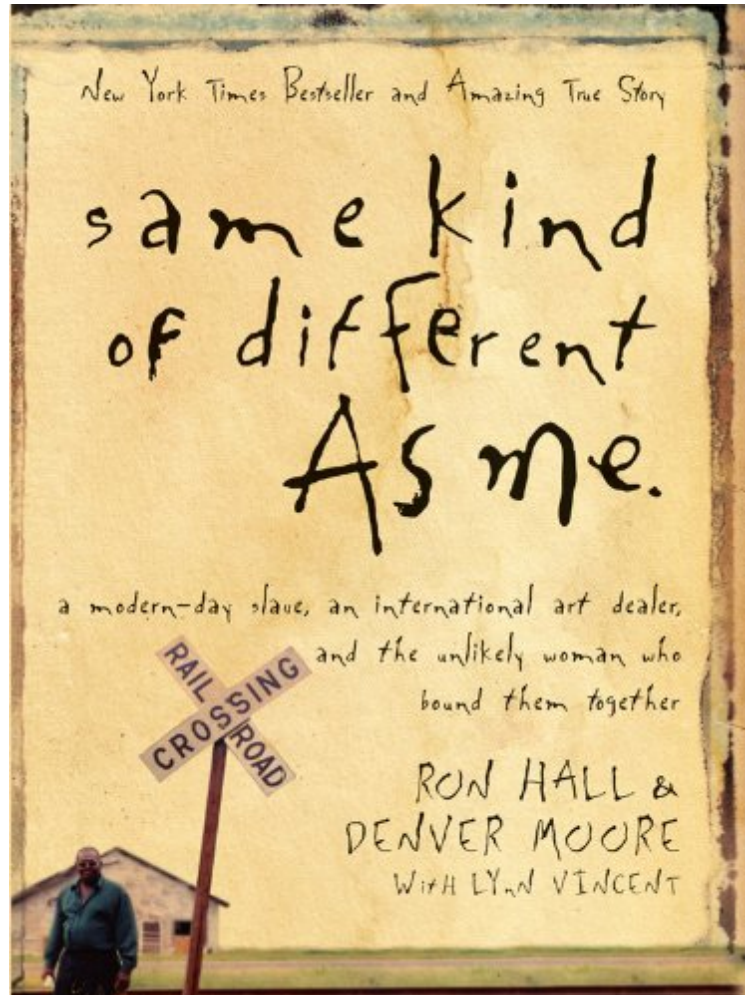

The story is threaded through journal-esque chapters that offer a back and forth dialogue between the two men. What makes this book so powerful is hearing the authors' perspectives on events that they witnessed, experiences they had and how their separated, diverse lives eventually connected, forming a bond that would endure incredible hardship. Denver reminisces about his painful early life that provide readers with an understanding of the harsh realities in an era of slavery and discrimination. On the opposite end of the spectrum, Hall embodies the all too common apathetic American. As a successful art connoisseur, Hall lives a life of wealth and comfort, concerned only with his needs. Through a twist of fate or in Hall's case, a twisted arm, the two discover true friendship through their growing faith in God.
